### WHAT IS THE GSEF?

The Global Social Economy Forum (GSEF) is an international association that brings together local governments and civil society actors who are committed to supporting the development of the social and solidarity economy (SSE).

Its mission is to promote cooperation among social and solidarity economy organizations and local governments in order to enable the creation of quality jobs, equitable growth and the advancement of participatory democracy and sustainable development.

At the association's founding meeting in 2014, the GSEF's members adopted a charter establishing its principles and operations, including the holding of a forum every two years. The first two forums were held in Seoul in 2013 and 2014.

#### **THEME**

Across the world, the social and solidarity economy (SSE) generates important economic impact, and, more importantly, social innovations that help address the challenges faced by city administrations and their communities. Whether it is meeting essential needs such as housing and food security, ensuring an adequate quality of life for residents through local services, cultural activities, and other recreational services, or contributing to social cohesion, SSE initiatives create jobs and support the more intelligent and sustainable development of cities.

Because of this, the aim of GSEF2016 is to facilitate collaboration between local governments and SSE actors by highlighting best practices, whether they be processes, tools, or innovative results emerging from co-constructed public policies. These **best practices** will be presented mainly by SSE and local government actors, though innovative citizen initiatives and private sector projects developed with the SSE will also be brought to the fore.



# MONTRÉAL: CHOICE DESTINATION AND FLAGSHIP CITY FOR THE SOCIAL ECONOMY

As the second largest francophone city in the world, Montréal is not only a cosmopolitan city, it is also a major international city and a UNESCO City of Design. Montréal's artistic and cultural identity is well-known, helping to make it a leading convention city and the top destination for international associative events in North America.

The City of Montréal is also known around the world for the proliferation of social economy initiatives in numerous sectors as well as for the public policy measures implemented to support this development. The Chantier de l'économie sociale, the other co-organiser of GSEF2016, works to coordinate, promote and support networks and enterprises of the social economy in Quebec, and enjoys significant international recognition for this work.
