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NOTE FROM THE SECRETARY GENERAL

After three years of reduced mobility due to the COVID-19 pandemic, in the final year of the implementation of our 2021-2023 Strategic Action Plan, we were able to host our first in-person Metropolis World Congress in six years. That reminded us that there is truly no substitute for seeing our membership gather in person for first-hand networking and exchanging ideas. Our 14th Metropolis World Congress was held in the framework of the Brussels Urban Summit, in collaboration with the Brussels Capital Region, Eurocities and OECD Champion Mayors. This gave our members further opportunities to broaden their network and engage with other international actors, and showed a way forward for Metropolis, in closer cooperation with other networks and organizations to maximize the benefits for our members to attend in-person meetings.

Aside from our Congress, we hosted and participated in a full schedule of international events where our members were able to connect with one another—including World Metropolitan Day, the Megacities Summit, the Guangzhou Award and the Global Mayors' Forum.

Nature-Based Solutions, successful strategies for Internationalisation of metropolises, metropolitan policies to support caregivers, and climate action in large cities have all been topics for exchange and discussion during the year. These conversations have shaped our planning as we move into 2024, where we will shift more focus to foresight and the future of smart cities.







BRUSSELS URBAN SUMMIT

Belgium | **12**—**15** June **2023**

The 14th Metropolis World Congress was held in the framework of the Brussels Urban Summit, together with the Eurocities General Assembly and the OECD Champion Mayors meeting. The gathering was a success with **over 1400 attendees from 322 cities from 82 countries.**

The main objective of the Brussels Urban Summit as a whole was to strengthen cooperation between cities globally, to boost the voice of cities in national and international policy-making and to discuss urban answers on global challenges. **Over 90 speakers** presented groundbreaking knowledge on trending topics for local governments, including climate, inequality, digital cities, migration & diversity and mobility.

250 representatives from 61 Metropolis members attended the event, enjoying the plenary sessions, side events, urban exchanges, power lunches, urban visits, city adventures and the Metropolis statutory meetings. Metropolis was proud to be a part of this event, bringing the metropolitan perspective and its members from all over the world.

Highlights



Metropolis General Assembly

The Metropolis General Assembly approved the 2024-2026 Strategic Action Plan and elected the Board of Directors, formed by 35 members from all regions of Metropolis. The newly elected Board of Directors elected a new Presidency, the Dakar Municipality, as the first African Presidency of Metropolis.

São Paulo was selected to host the 2024 in-person Board of Directors and the Seoul Metropolitan Government to host the 2025 Metropolis Anniversary Congress.



Investment Forum

Metropolis hosted our **first-ever** Investment Forum – a session to exchange and share inspiring funding and financing practices developed by public and private actors. The projects selected through the Investment Forum call were presented to financial institutions and investors for feedback.

Over 30 projects applied with 20 cities and 6 international organizations participating. **Two of our members proceeded to advanced talks for funding their projects.**

Metropolitan diplomacy and advocacy

1 World Metropolitan Day

<u>World Metropolitan Day 2023</u> was **hosted by Marmara Municipalities Union**, in the framework of the Marmara Urban Forum (MARUF). On 7 October, over 240 participants gathered to hear from mayors and representatives from metropolises from across the world—about how we can create healthier and more resilient metropolitan spaces.

2 Officialization of World Metropolitan Day

Metropolis is leading a campaign to designate World Metropolitan Day as an International Day, adopted by the UN General Assembly. 3 First ever Megacities Summit

On 8 October, Istanbul and Metropolis hosted the <u>first</u> <u>Megacities Summit</u>. It was a unique opportunity to discuss amongst peers and the start of a collaboration that Metropolis will continue to support.



4 Metropolis Care Campaign

Metropolis launched the <u>Metropolis Care Campaign</u> to transform cities through care. A series of events were organized by Metropolis to raise awareness of this important topic, including an event at Metropolis World Congress in Brussels, a session at the Smart City Expo in Barcelona and an online session on the care economy.

5 Involvement in U20 process

Metropolis collaborated in the <u>U20 process</u> by participating in the working group about Reinventing Frameworks for Urban Governance and Planning. <u>Download the final paper.</u>

6 Cities Summit of the Americas

Metropolis co-ed a plenary session titled **The Role of Cities in Global Leadership and the Multilateral System** at the <u>Cities Summit of the Americas</u> in Denver, Colorado—in collaboration with The Brookings Institution. It featured three Metropolis member mayors (of Kyiv, Tijuana and Bogotá) as well as US Ambassador to the United Nations; US Special Ambassador for City Diplomacy; ICLEI president and Mayor of Des Moines, Iowa; and United Cities and Local Governments (UCLG) Secretary General.

City Diplomacy and International Cooperation seminar

The Secretary General participated in a **City Diplomacy and International Cooperation seminar at the FONARI (National Forum of Municipal Managers of International Relations)**, hosted by São Paulo City Government. The event showcased the work of the network and highlighted the importance of connecting internationally with their peers.

8 European Metropolitan Report

The European Metropolitan Report marked the **culmination of our global metropolitan report series**. This comprehensive collection was made possible with the support of the AMB. The European Metropolitan Report was showcased at the <u>European Metropolitan Authorities Forum in Helsinki</u>, the <u>Congreso de las Ciudades in Bilbao</u> and internally within the Metropolitan Area of Barcelona.

Capacities for metropolitan governance

1 Guangzhou Award and Global Mayors' Forum

The 6th edition of the <u>Guangzhou Award for Urban Innovation</u> and the 3rd <u>Global Mayors' Forum</u> were held in December. There were 2 Metropolis members among the 5 winners and **over 30** mayors were in attendance. Guangzhou committed to renew the three-year sponsorship agreement with Metropolis.

2 Internationalisation for local authorities training course

Metropolis hosted its first executive training on Internationalisation for local authorities, supported by Barcelona City Council and in collaboration with the University of Melbourne. The course brought together participants from cities across the world to learn how to foster international action in their territory.

3 Online learning

Throughout 2023, Metropolis hosted **6 online learning activities** with a total of over **300 participants**. This included webinars from the <u>Clearing House Project</u> presenting expert guidelines to assist cities globally to implement Urban Forests and Nature-Based Solutions.

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4 Workshop for Indonesian metropolises


Metropolis collaborated with UCLG ASPAC and the FMDV (Global Fund for Cities Development) to hold a one-day workshop in Jakarta on **Opportunities for Internationalisation of Indonesian Metropolises.** The event was an exclusive platform for 40 participants from Indonesian cities to speak directly to seasoned practitioners.

5 AVANTIA project

The <u>Avantia Project</u>, which promotes sustainable urban mobility with a gender vision, **diagnosed over 600 km of cycling infrastructure in Bogotá** following national and international standards—**up 61% from its original objective**.

6 International Seminar on Multilateral City Diplomacy

In a visit to Guangzhou, the Metropolis team collaborated with UCLG/UCLG ASPAC to host an International Seminar on Multilateral City Diplomacy. There were participants from 17 Chinese member cities, as well as 4 non-members.

7 Workshop for Bolivian metropolises

The Autonomous Government of Santa Cruz worked with Metropolis to convene metropolitan authorities for a one-day workshop **Bolivian Metropolises in a Global Context.** The workshop supported cities to improve their international projection through technical visits and interactions with international organizations.

8 Technical assistance

Metropolis helped to secure specific technical assistance on naturebased solutions implementation from the **European Forest Institute, for two member cities.**

Internal governance and culture

To improve Metropolis' processes and accountability, we have decided to implement a new management tool. So far in 2023, we have implemented a **new contact relationship** management system and a new project management system—which will improve our ability to track and react to the needs of our membership.

In the future, the tool will be expanded to cover all the needs of Metropolis, including evaluation, HR management, knowledge management and expenses. This will free up resources in the Secretariat General and allow us to dedicate more time to our members and our other activities.

We are continuing to build a financially sustainable organiation through diverse funding sources and robust accountability.

GENDER IMPACT ASSESSMENT

In the 2021-2023 Strategic Action Plan, we outlined the importance of developing and strengthening our actions, and policies on gender equality—to create metropolises that include **diverse voices and experiences**.

Our Gender Mainstreaming strategy promotes the **incorporation of gender equality at the center of urban and metropolitan policies** and advocates for the inclusion of gender equality in global agendas.

This allows us to generate a common base of gender knowledge which helps to place gender issues on the agenda of our membership, and contributes to implementing global and regional agendas for the rights of women and vulnerable groups.

Metropolitan diplomacy and advocacy

At the Brussels Urban Summit, Metropolis hosted a workshop on The Power of Care. The session formally launched the Metropolis Care Campaign—highlighting the invisible, undervalued and unpaid or underpaid care work, which is disproportionately carried out by women. Metropolis President Claudia López spoke often at Metropolis events in 2023 about Bogotá's care blocks.



Capacities for metropolitan governance

Tackling gender disparities is at the heart of the Avantia Project. In Bogotá, women represent less than 2% of the staff of Trasmilenio, the main operator of the urban bus fleet. To address this, all activities are supported by the District Women's Secretariat to guarantee the inclusion of the gender approach.



Internal governance and culture

Women make up 63% of the Metropolis Secretariat General Team, but we still have work to do. In the next strategic period we aim to improve the presence of women in our decision-making bodies.



Looking forward...

Metropolis has received **funding from the Open Society Foundation for the next 3 years** to promote feminist leadership in government and pilot initiatives to promote care systems in cities around the world.
