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NOTE FROM THE SECRETARY GENERAL

In today's fast-moving, globally networked world, the pandemic is only the latest problem to expose the complex challenges facing our metropolitan spaces. The mission of Metropolis for the next three years is to help our members not only respond to these challenges as they exist today, but to plan ahead for them as they will exist tomorrow.

During these months, while starting the implementation of our Strategic Action Plan 2021-2023, we have strengthened our global leadership and our alliances by participating in diverse international meetings and conferences. We have also launched the contest Metropolis Through Children's eyes, addressed to children from 5 years old to 15 years old, through which we aim to get the vision of the children living in our metropolises and look at their perspectives for the future. The winners will be revealed during our XIII Metropolis World Congress in November.

We have set up several initiatives in order to build adaptive capacities for metropolitan governance like the Strategic Planning

and Metropolitan Governance online program, the City Managers Community 2021, the Respond, Rebuild, Reinvent (RRR) project and the Mobility in African cities pilot project. At the same time, we keep creating content in two ongoing projects strongly related with the second action line of our Action Plan: Learning from Cities and MetroTalks.

Moreover, to promote within Metropolis a strategy of gender mainstreaming, we have launched the manual on Gender-Sensitive Language in Spanish and French and the report: Gender impact assessment 2020.

Even though we still have a long way to overcome the challenges we have set ourselves for this three-year period, I hope this progress report will show how dedicated, committed and conscientious the Metropolis membership are with the new Strategic Action Plan. Also, on behalf of the Secretariat General, I would like to thank our members for their continued efforts to improve the performance of our metropolises.

MAPPING A GREEN FUTURE: URBAN PLANNING UNDER THE PARK CITY INITIATIVE



To showcase the challenges of “building a city within a park and not parks within a city”, Metropolis Learning Hub Chengdu with the support of the Chengdu Institute of Planning and Design organised the first edition of the webinar “[Mapping a Green Future: Urban Planning under the Park City Initiative](#)” which was held on 20th and 21st May.

The webinar was divided in two sessions, in which participants were able to learn from experiences from Glasgow, Chengdu, Seoul, Johannesburg, Dujiangyan and ICLEI East Asia. The first session held on 20th May focused on thinking and designing sustainable urban development in a holistic and integrated way; the second one emphasised on ambitious projects to advocate green life.

The second webinar series will be held on 2nd December and will focus on water management and green spaces around grey areas.

CALL FOR PEER LEARNING PARTNERSHIP ON SSE ECOSYSTEMS

In 2020, the OECD launched the Global Action “Promoting Social and Solidarity Economy Ecosystems (SSE)”, funded by the European Union’s Foreign Partnership Instrument, that would cover more than 30 countries (EU countries, Brazil, Canada, India, Korea, Mexico and the United States) over a period of three years.

Within this frame, the project [Respond, Rebuild, Reinvent \(RRR\)](#) offered 8 cities the opportunity to learn, share and collaborate across countries and world regions with the aim of promoting peer learning on SSE Ecosystems. By SSE Ecosystem we mean the totality of people, organisations, institutions and infrastructures in a territory that enable social and solidarity economy organisations to generate impact.

The RRR project, led by UpSocial in a consortium of 16 partners including Ashoka, Metropolis and Eurocities, was one of the 6 projects selected by the OECD to support the development and internationalisation of the Social and Solidarity Economy (SSE), raise awareness and capacity to build conducive national and local ecosystems for SSE development, and



promote knowledge sharing and peer exchanges at the international level.

Through this call for applications, RRR selected 8 cities to learn, share and collaborate across countries and world regions.

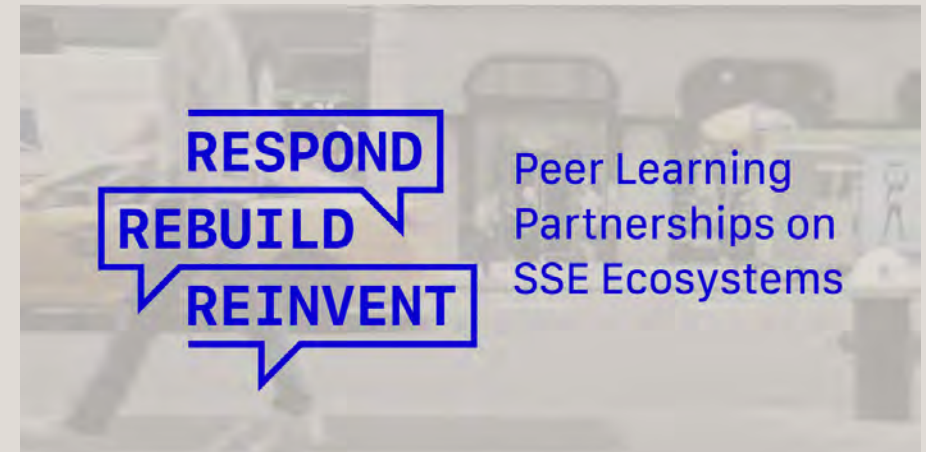

The first online meeting of the Metropolis City Managers Community in 2021 brought together fifteen representatives from our membership who are in charge of implementing 5G technology and was moderated by Alexander Heichlinger, Senior Expert and Consultant in city management. 5G, the new global wireless standard that will allow for faster internet connection, innovative possibilities for automation and remote operations of a myriad of services, depends primarily on infrastructure located in public space managed by city governments and metropolitan authorities.

Exclusive to representatives of the Metropolis membership, the 5G webinar offered to a small group of people with similar responsibilities in their metropolises the opportunity to get to know each other, discuss the preliminary

findings of the survey 5G Metropolitan Portrait, exchange additional information about their 5G initiatives, delimit the topic and dynamics of the next activities of the group, scheduled for October and November.

LAUNCHING THE REPORT: GENDER IMPACT ASSESSMENT 2020



Over several years, Metropolis has driven the debate on gender-sensitive policies by promoting the incorporation of gender perspective at the center of urban and metropolitan policies and advocating for the inclusion of gender equality in global agendas.

Last May, a new report, on the mainstreaming of gender strategy in Metropolis, was published. Despite of the COVID-19 pandemic, the gender mainstreaming perspective was implemented in 52 activities, with the latter achieving 85% of outcomes. Concerning internal governance, the gender coordination strategy is being consolidated, Metropolis is also striving to achieve gender equality by electing the first female President, the Mayor of Bogotá, Ms. Claudia López

However, much work remains to be done; some of the challenges for the coming year are the reinforcement of strategic partnerships, the development of tools and the strengthening of a coordination structure to promote the mainstreaming of gender strategy in all projects and activities.
